Dec. 21st marks the first official day of Winter and WOW does it ever feel like it! Thank you for bundling up your children and bringing them to school this week. The first day of Winter is also known as the **Winter Solstice**. This day is significant to many First Nations Communities.



"Winter solstice is a celebration of light returning to Turtle Island. It is the shortest day of the year. Grandfather Sun begins to shine longer each day, bringing a promise of warmer weather, growth, and new life. Darkness can represent struggle, and light brings hope of easier times. Elder Randy Bottle (Saa'kokoto) teaches us that the Solstice begins a new year. It is a time for reflection, to look back at moons past and look forward to the "new sun" of the future; a time to appreciate what transpired over the past year, lessons that have been learned, and to set new intentions.

In this process is the notion of renewal. Is what we know, or think we know, still true? Is it still valid? Ceremony itself is an action of renewal; to renew the knowledge and traditions that have been passed down from Elders through generations. To renew the truth of Indigenous ways of knowing and being. The solstice is a time of significance, celebration, ceremony and song for some Indigenous cultures. We celebrate light and the return of Grandfather Sun - light sustains life and for that we have gratitude for all of creation." "Today marks the winter solstice and the shortest day of the year. Many Indigenous people have special names, traditions, and teachings surrounding this day. For the Anishinaabe, for example, the winter solstice is known as Gichi Magoshe Giizhigan or Feast Day. It is a time for recognizing the changing seasons and preparing for winter. During these months, it's important to take lessons from the animals – adapt, migrate, or hibernate. It's a time to connect with the land and reflect on its significance in our lives. Moving? ***INTERNAL TRANSFER PROCESS***

If your family is moving to a home that is outside the boundary of your child's current campus, your child may remain at that campus but you will be responsible for transporting your child to and from school. Bussing is not available outside the designated campus boundaries. If you require transportation, you will need to apply for an internal transfer to the campus designated for your new address. The deadline is March 1, 2023 to be considered for the 2023/24 year. The transfer requests are now done through the Online Wait List system. Internal transfer Requests will precede wait list students (including priority status and siblings, but not including deferred priority). If the requested campus is unable

to accommodate your student, he/she will still have a guaranteed seat at the current campus. Please see the following link for the instructions to request a transfer through the Online Wait List system.

Please note:

- transfers do not occur mid-year
- transfers can only occur if a seat becomes available in the requested campus (possible wait of up to 6 years)
- we may not be able to accommodate all children in the same family
